With all we have been involved with we seem to be taking on more all the time. I have just returned from our national board meeting and the working group I serve on regarding the future of VVA. During our working group it was mentioned that we, as a national organization, do not reach out at the state or national level to post Vietnam veterans. This was brought to the attention of the national leadership for some action. I was appointed as chair of the national committee to attempt to fix this problem. I will be working with some people from around the country to address how to accomplish this task and use what we all do at the local levels to the state and national levels. I have also been in contact with some very active veterans from the Iraq war that have given us some very good insight. Our own Brian McKeown has told me a lot of the same things I have heard from them and I will be asking him for his assistance in this endeavor.

There will be a national leadership conference in July in Palm Springs. There are some of already attending but if you would like information on it, ask or go to VVA.org and look on the page for the leadership conference. The two working groups will be reporting out and looking for feedback for their future reports.

We had a great time at the BBQ and are looking forward to more of these events. There should be something in the newsletter about our upcoming function. I like the idea of having these at no cost to the members, families and veterans. This is a great way for us to get together and talk about whatever and get a chance to listen to the concerns of veterans. We have some real serious issues coming up and things are happening that will affect our lives and our families lives for years to come,

We also had a good ribbon cutting event for the

"Wall" on our hallway wall in the veterans building. We had a small turnout and congressman Thompson was there to cut the ribbon and say a few words. I had invited all the staffers and elected representatives in our area that I had contact with to the event. None of them must have had time to attend or say they were unable to attend. In all fairness I did not talk to the Santa Rosa city council, so I cannot put them in the same noncaring category.

At the national board meeting I sit on the Agent Orange committee. we discussed the concerns we have about not getting the information to veterans and their children about the toxic exposures. If you have seen the news you will have seen stories about the toxins around our military bases in the US. This is becoming a more wide spread problem and we are hoping that the people affected are being informed about the assistance that may be available.

We have been watching and discussing the push that is going on to privatize the Veterans Administration. This is something we all need to watch even if you do not use the VA for your health care. Some of the ideas going around are to make the VA for Purple Heart recipients and then treat others for their service connected injuries only. There are also some that just want to close all the VA hospitals, and have you go to your local hospital. They would also stop the research that is done by the VA as a cost saver. I could sit here and give you more reasons to have the VA than not to have it, but it is all about money and not health care. The people pushing this want the veterans to get a Medicare type card and let you go find your own health care provides that would be paid in part by the government.

I would like to thank everyone for their vote of confidence in electing me to another term as your president. We have been making some great things happen in the last few years. If you look at my calendar you would wonder how I get anything done. That is an easy thing to answer,

VVA WOMEN VETERAN COMMIT-TEE REPORT. APRIL 13, 2018. SIL-VER SPRINGS, MD. Kate O'Hare-Palmer

The meeting was called to order at 2:08pm. There were 17 members and guests in attendance. The January meeting minutes were approved with minor name spelling corrections. The agenda for today's meeting had two additions.

Topics:

- 1) Michael Keating, Veteran Magazine Editor, came and spoke about idea of highlighting women important to the history of VVA in the Fall issue of the magazine. There will be an excerpt from 'Home Before Morning', Lynda Van DeVenter's book. He wants to emphasize the history, women veteran issues, and the bridge between our era and today's women veterans. There was some great discussion on some of the early days and the first and second conventions and some of the women's involvement. Marsha has some past articles that were copied and given to Michael...stories are encouraged to be emailed to Kate and Michael by June 2018.
- 2) Report of the Chair. Working in California on veteran issues. I have been elected as

- Sonoma County Veteran of the Year and will attend two local parades, speak for Memorial Day at our Memorial Park, and speak at the City Hall Chambers. We are still working with fire victims from last October. It will be a long process.
- 3) Budget reviewed. Last cycle showed a 12% overage. Due to increased travel expenses.
 4) SWAN report on Sexual Harassment and As sault was reviewed. Encouraged members to take this home to share with chapters and state councils. It was an on line survey plus results of focus groups. Over 50% of those surveyed

do use the VA for health care. The top three personal challenges included (a) job and as signment opportunities (b) gender bias© family policies and practices. The top three community challenges included (a)gender bias (b)family policies and practices(c)Sexual Harassment & Assault. The most important factors for staying in the service included being part of a team; job security; financial considerations; commitment to mission. The most important factor for leaving the Service included family considerations; lack of promotion and job opportunities; lack of community/inclusion. Top priorities for women veterans include Mental health, financial stability, and connecting to a community of fellow women veterans. Their other concerns include: access to women-specific health care and navigating the VA claims and health care system.

- 5) Webpage: the committee chairs had Jeff Gulich, VVA webmaster, present some new ways to improve access to the committee reports on the web and additional information that we want to share with the membership.
- 6) Leadership conference. A seminar topic was submitted on, "New rules of engagement: Sexual Harassment Prevention Training." Discussion held on ways to include various teaching models. The seminars will be announced tomorrow.
- 7) VVA Women Veteran Reception 11.09.2018 @ 5pm in O'Bryne Gallary at the DAR building in DC for the 25th Anniversary of Vietnam Women's Memorial. Much discussion and details coming.
- 8) Maureen presented topic on mature women veterans prosthetics for gynecological/ urology issues in conjunction with the VA.

In 1965, I was recruited with three classmates to the Army. We were all very eager to have our tuition for nursing school paid! In my senior year at Saint Josephs College of Nursing in San Francisco, I made a three-year commitment to pay back, as a lieutenant, my service to the Army. All of this happened when the Vietnam War was escalating and most of us have a little idea what path this commitment had put us on!

As a young nurse at Letterman General Army Hospital at the Presidio in San Francisco, I still recall the challenges we had treating our new patients with serious injuries. Our patients were such brave men!! Letterman, the World War II era facility where I worked, had long hallways and each ward accommodated over 20 patients. I worked on the orthopedic and thoracic units.


